OPINION: STUDENT CHALLENGES TO DRESS CODES AT THE ST. PAUL'S SCHOOLS

When you step into the hallways of The St. Paul's Schools, it's likely that the first thing you'll notice is the way students are dressed. Whether you are up the hill, where students have a dress code, or down the hill, where students wear a specified uniform, clothing is a key aspect of the schools' environments.

The St. Paul's Schools (TSPS) includes two different schools, St. Paul's School for Boys and St. Paul's School for Girls, which were unified under a single board in July of 2018. However, the schools operate independently in some ways, which leads to clashes on things such as clothing. In the past few years, many students have expressed opposition to their school's dress code/uniform.

SP Dress Code

St. Paul's School for Boys (SP) has a dress code that requires collared shirts and neckties, but allows students to choose the color and style of these items. SP's dress code prohibits wearing earrings at school functions, such as chapel. It also requires students to cover visible tattoos. Acceptable bottoms include "khakis, corduroys or dress slacks," and skirts are banned at SP. The full dress code can be found here.

"Seek truth" are the first words of the SP mission statement, which Collin Pachilis '24 can attest to. Collin, like several students at SP, criticizes the school's dress code. His objection is centered mainly on the belief that SP's dress code is non-inclusive of the identities of transgender and gender non-conforming people. Collin circulated a petition in December 2021 that outlined his concerns regarding SP's dress code. It currently has 234 signatures.

Against the administration at SP, Collin argued that earrings and skirts are key forms of self-expression, especially in a school that already limits one's dress. Collin also stated that despite the dress code allowing for slightly different styles of pants and shirts, the ban of skirts and earrings negates any attempt to accommodate variability. For example, transgender students at a traditionally boys' school should be able to express their identity through a skirt. SP cites "professionalism" in their justification for prohibiting skirts and other "trends in fashion," but Collin argued that this is hypocritical because students at

SPSG wear skirts as part of their uniform. Furthermore, even cisgender, straight males can wear skirts; they should not be limited to certain parts of the community.

Based on the administrative response, dress code change is unlikely at SP, especially this school year. Administration, including dean of students Mr. Kevin Benzing, defended the dress code, justifying the prohibition of skirts and earrings with the claim that the dress code had room for expression and flexibility. Dr. Edward Trusty, the head of school for SP, compared their school's dress code to other independent boys' schools across the country, suggesting that SP should and does look to other schools as a model. Dr. Trusty also likened the opposition from students to the dress code to families' opposition to the school's handling of the pandemic. He stated that there will always be backlash and varying forms of acceptance in the community and that his role is to do "what is best for the school," implying that keeping the current dress code is his belief of the school's best path.

SPSG Dress Code

Some students at St. Paul's School for Girls (SPSG) also object to the uniform, but for different reasons. A uniform gives specific clothing items that students must wear, which for SPSG upper school students are a polo shirt, khakis/a uniform skirt (based on the season), and one of three approved sweatshirts. Lately, an increasing number of students have been coming to school out of uniform (wearing sweatpants and out-of-uniform sweatshirts). Several have voiced opposition to the lack of sweatshirt variety allowed, and rules that many see as unjustified.

I interviewed Ms. Murray, the Dean of Students at SPSG, for her perspective on the uniform and students' resistance to it. Although she cannot speak for the entire administration, Ms. Murray has dealt with uniform challenges before and throughout the pandemic, both as an administrator and a teacher. She defined the uniform as something that unites students and allows them to focus academically. "Similarly to how sports teams wear the same uniform," said Ms. Murray, "a school uniform can build that sense of community." In the world of high school anxiety and stress, Ms. Murray says uniforms give students "one less thing to worry about": they eliminate, or at least drastically reduce, the common anxiety of being cool enough and having the "right" clothes.

Many students have advocated for the inclusion of additional sweatshirts into the uniform. However, from Ms. Murray's point of view, that is a slippery slope. She recognizes that many school teams and clubs have apparel, and to be fair to all would mean making them all a part of the uniform. For most sweatshirts, it's not that some are inappropriate or informal, but that allowing a wide variety of designs instead of the plainer uniform sweatshirts would detract from the purpose of the uniform.

"It gets into this place," says Ms. Murray, "of being, like, 'Oh my gosh, I have to buy all of these things to keep up with my classmates." By limiting the number of sweatshirts allowed, SPSG can both "reduce the stress" of students to buy more apparel and "make things more accessible" economically. Ms. Murray

also points out, "There's a difference between school attire and putting the school's name and brand out there in other fun ways." In other words, the school uniform is not meant to be inherently fashionable; the school store provides an opportunity to wear sweatshirts outside of school that are more expressive.

Ms. Murray acknowledges that lessened school spirit during the pandemic could be contributing to the reduced effort that students put into being in uniform. "I think it's feeling connected to the community that fuels school spirit," she says, and, of course, spirit in areas of everyone's lives has waned in the past two years. She attests that "people are tired as a whole," and thinks pandemic fatigue for both teachers and students has "contributed to why we're seeing what we're seeing," in terms of uniform. For teachers, giving out demerits (offenses that are entered into the school's system) is, understandably, not their main priority. Especially during Covid, "there are a lot of things on a teacher's mind in a day [other than just the uniform]," Ms. Murray states.

Students have had to adapt to many changes, including a hybrid mode last year, eating lunch in advisory when cases had risen, and social distancing. "What we're seeing," in terms of students being out of uniform, Ms. Murray says, "is not new...it's sort of more rampant, though." High school is a time in which many teens test boundaries, but the number of students out of uniform during the 20-21 and especially 21-22 school year is significantly higher than in pre-pandemic years.

However, Ms. Murray also maintains the idea that "following rules in general shows respect to the institution" of SPSG. It's not that most students purposefully disobey the dress code, she says, but that the connection between the students and the school has waned as we have all had to cope with the new normal. "As people, we just need to reset...standards around respect." After almost two years in the pandemic, a greater sense of respect is needed in our school and the larger world.

Regarding change, Ms. Murray states that it's "healthy [for students] to question things," and that she "[wants] students to be comfortable to be able to ask why" certain rules are in place. Rules have been changed in the past, such as the switch to tennis shoes a little less than a decade ago, and the inclusion of Spirit Fridays. Spirit Fridays allow students to wear any SPSG shirt and/or sweatshirt along with their regular uniform skirt or khakis. Although Spirit Fridays were emphasized by students more in the years directly following their creation, the administration's response is clear: they are willing to work with the student body and find a way that students can show their team/club pride while still respecting their school. "[The] bottom line," Ms. Murray noted, "is we believe in student voice at our school and would welcome your thoughts."

"I believe we will see this improve as we continue to get back to [our] normal life," Ms. Murray said, concerning the uniform, and this is the hope for many things that have suffered during the pandemic. As pandemic restrictions start to fade, Ms. Murray foresees students returning to being in perfect (or, at

least, near-perfect) uniform. When teachers, students, and administration have the capacity to make it a more central focus again, uniform adherence is expected to improve.

The two upper schools have very different approaches and, therefore, different student criticism of clothing. Opposition towards the SP dress code stems from a call for inclusivity, while opposition towards the SPSG uniform is centered around pandemic fatigue. Ultimately, the decision to wear a uniform or obey a dress code comes with attending The St. Paul's Schools. Students may differ on their feelings regarding clothing, but both the SP and SPSG administrations make it clear that dress is an integral part of students' success and identity. Regardless of your feelings on uniform/dress code, respect is an essential part of change. If we have learned anything from the pandemic, it is that we must have grace for each other in order to expect that same grace in return.
